Chapter 16_ A Well-Preserved Woman ...

In this chapter of "Mother Night," the narrator reflects on an emotional reunion with his wife, Helga. The couple finds themselves amidst a mix of joyous and somber feelings as they navigate their shared past and the trials that have separated them for many years.
