? If you travel through County Essex, England, you may visit the village of Ugley. And if you go a few more miles to the west to County Herefordshire, you'll end up in the hamlet of Nasty.

? A nom de plume is just a fancy, French term for a "pen name." Many notable authors have used them, including Stephen King, who sometimes wrote as "Richard Bachman."

Swastika Mukherjee is the name of a popular Indian actress born in 1980. The word swastika, as well as the symbol, goes back to India more than 3,500 years ago.

? Lancaster County, Pennsylvania is home to the towns of Intercourse, Paradise, and Blue Ball, which is interesting considering it's the heart of Amish country. ? Halfdan the Mild was a Viking king who got his nickname for being stingy with food but generous with gold. His father was Eystein Halfdansson, or Eystein Fret.

? Embarrass, Minnesota gets its unique name from the French word, embarrass, which means "to hinder with obstacles or difficulties." Apparently, even the hearty voyageurs found the town's extreme cold a bit too much.

? In the 1960s British sci-fi spy thriller TV show, The Prisoner, every character had a number for a name. Number 6 was the name of the main character.

? Richard Braine was a British politician with the UK Independence Party (UKIP). His opponents liked to refer to him as "Dick Braine."

? The town of Saint-Louis-du-Ha! Ha! has the dubious distinction of being the only town in the world with two exclamation marks in its name. It's right ahead of Westward Ho!, England.

? A nom de guerre ("name of war") is sometimes used by guerillas and terrorists. "Carlos the Jackal" was the nom de guerre of Venezuelan terrorist, Ilich Ramírez Sánchez.

? Taumata whakatangihanga koauau o tamatea turi pukaka piki maunga? horo nuku pokai whenua ki tana tahu is the longest place name in the world. It's a M?ori name for hill in New Zealand, which locals just call "Taumata."

? Harry Baals was the mayor of Fort Wayne, Indiana from 1934 to 1947, and again from 1951 until he died in 1954. His descendants pronounce the name "Bales."

? The nickname "Lefty" is quite popular in the US with lefthanded baseball pitchers, but also some notable gangsters. Mobsters Frank "Lefty" Rosenthal and Benjamin "Lefty" Ruggiero were two notorious lefties.

? Llanfairpwllgwyngyll is the name of a quaint Welsh town on the Island of Anglesey. If you think you've mastered that, try its full name, Llanfair pwllgwyngyll gogery chwyrn drobwll llan tysilio gogo? goch.

? Ironic nicknames cross cultures and languages. Men nicknamed "Slim" or "Tiny" are almost always large, as is the case in Spanish-speaking countries with the name "Flaco."

? Pickaway County, Ohio has a number of places named "Hitler," including Hitler Road and Hitler Park. The names come from an influential German American who was not related in any way to the Hitler.

? Alfonso IX was the king of the Spanish kingdoms of Leon and

Galicia from 1188 to 1230. He played a major role in the Reconquista, but he's best remembered as "The Slobberer."

? Although English-speaking tourists probably giggle when they travel through Condom, France, the French word means "field of the confluence."

? Kash Register is the name of a man who was convicted of murder in 1979 but exonerated in 2013. Register then cashed in when he was awarded \$16.7 million for his wrongful conviction.

? The whale shark is the largest fish in the world. Whale sharks can grow to 50 feet long and despite the "whale" in its name, it's 100% fish.

? Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley gifted 18 bluegills - the Illinois State fish - to the crown prince of Japan in 1960. Once in Japan, the bluegills spread and became an invasive species.

? Fish breathe oxygen through their gills. The gills diffuse the oxygen through the fish's membranes.

? The coelacanth is a fish species that was believed to have been extinct for 65 to 66 million years until one was caught off the coast of South Africa in 1938. There are only two known species of coelacanths: one that lives near the Comoros Islands off the east coast of Africa, and one found in the waters off Sulawesi, Indonesia.

? The consumption of fish on Fridays during Lent is a Catholic tradition that dates back to the Middle Ages. Interestingly, beaver and alligator were exempted.

? Every US state has at least one "state fish." Those in the Centrarchidae (sunfish) family are the most popular, which include bass, bluegill, and crappie.

? The beluga sturgeon is the largest freshwater fish in the world. These beasts can grow to 24 feet long and weigh 2,500 pounds but are only found in the Caspian and the Black Sea basins. The world record was 3,463 lbs. and 23ft 7in long!

? When the Nubian King Piye conquered Egypt in 728 BCE, he refused to meet with all but one of the chieftains and "kings" of Lower Egyptian because they were "fish eaters."

? The name Fish Kill or Fishkill actually means the opposite of what you think. "Kill" is derived from the Dutch word for a creek so it

means "Fish Creek."

? A fish's age can be determined by counting rings on its scales or those on its ear bones, which are known as otoliths. These are similar to the rings on trees.

? "Pan fish" is the term in the US for fish that can fit neatly into a frying pan. Although many species can technically fit the definition, it's generally reserved for sunfish, crappies, and perch.

? The muskellunge, or "muskie," is the largest member of the freshwater pike family and native to North America. Ferocious predators, muskies have even taken bites out of swimmers!

? When fish gather for social reasons, such as mating or protection, they are "shoaling." When that group begins moving together in a synchronized way then they are "schooling."

? In Japanese mythology, Namazu was a giant catfish that lived underground and caused earthquakes. He was especially associated with Lake Biwa.

? Unlike most fish, which give birth by laying eggs, some shark species - such as hammerheads, bull, and blue sharks - give birth to fully formed "pups."

? Starfish and jellyfish are not fish. A starfish is an echinoderm, while a jellyfish is cnidaria.

? "Shore lunches" are popular with recreational fishermen in North America. It simply involves frying any fish you caught that day in a pan over a fire when back on shore or at a camp.

? Carp includes a number of oily fish species native to Eurasia but considered invasive in most other parts of the world. Goldfish and koi are members of the carp family, Cyprinidae.

? Except for sharks, most fish don't have eyelids. Fish do, though, have a rest cycle where their brain activity and metabolism are greatly reduced.

? All fish have vertical tail fins, while aquatic mammals, such as dolphins and whales, have horizontal tail fins. This is probably due to a strange quirk of evolution.

? The burbot is often referred to as an "eel-pout," but it's actually in the cod family. The burbot is the only freshwater member of the cod family.

? Seahorses are the only species of fish that swim upright. They're also notable for the male carrying the eggs and giving birth to the brood.
